

For the past five years, Hertfordshire LEP and the Hertfordshire Careers Hub have commissioned a survey to be conducted by Amazing Apprenticeships of parents and carers in Hertfordshire regarding their confidence, interest and awareness of apprenticeships.

The level of engagement from parents and carers across the county has grown each year.

2019 = 14 schools / 845 participants

2020 = 17 schools / 1,266 participants

2021 = 22 schools / 1,676 participants

2022 = 52 schools / 2,826 participants

2023 = 51 schools / 3,225 participants

This year's survey saw a **14% increase in the volume of participants** responding to the survey, with **51 schools** across Hertfordshire achieving **3,225 individual responses**.





Careers Options

3 in 4 (75%) of respondent's children had already identified a career interest, up from 74% in 2022. This is evidence that more students have greater awareness of future career possibilities and suggests that there is better careers information available to them. The top 5 most popular careers were identified as **Creative & Media**, **Computing**, **Tech & Digital**, **Sports & Leisure**, **Business & Finance** and **Science & Research**.

We introduced a number of new career category options this year, including Performing Arts, Social Media and Criminology. These new additions may have diluted the perceived popularity of some of the existing categories such as Creative & Media, Science & Research, Law & Legal and Computing, technology and digital.

Apprenticeship Consideration

70% of this year's survey respondents would consider an apprenticeship for their child, a **6% increase** since 2022.

Since 2022, there has been a slight decrease (1%) in the percentage of parents/carers who answered that they would not encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship as an option after school or college. There has also been a decline (5%) in those that were unsure.

Parents were most likely to encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship in **year 10** and **year 12**, least likely in year 13 and most unsure in years 7-8. This could represent that parents aren't really thinking about post school destinations in Year 7-8 so therefore don't seek or have much information. By the time their child reaches year 10 and above, an apprenticeship becomes a more serious and positive consideration, and by year 13 parents and carers have already considered their options with their child and are more confident about whether an apprenticeship is suitable and may have already decided on their next step.





Application Awareness

Overall, just over 1 in 10 parents feel confident about the apprenticeship application process. Previously, the percentage of parents/carers who felt that they had all the relevant information to help their child apply for an apprenticeship did rise from 8% to 12% in 2020 but has since dropped back to 11% in 2023.

There is a clear, progressive increase in apprenticeship application awareness and confidence amongst parents and carers as their children progress through the school years, with application awareness levels at Year 13 being highest (18%).

Influencers, Drivers & Discouraging Factors

The biggest positive influencers and drivers were **gaining relevant skills in their area of interest**, gaining valuable experience in the workplace and earning a salary whilst gaining a qualification. The biggest discouraging factors were employers not valuing apprentices as highly as graduates, concerns about the possibility of university benefiting them more and missing out on the social side of university.

Apprenticeship Level Awareness

Amongst this year's respondents, awareness was highest for Advanced (Level 3) apprenticeships and lowest for Degree (Level 6 and 7) apprenticeships. The results for 2022 showed an increase in awareness across all levels.

Other Options

Regarding other available options, respondent's understanding of T Levels were lowest, with respondents feeling most confident with A levels. Only 13% of parents and carers felt that they knew a lot about FE College, but 39% would still encourage their child to follow this option.

Biggest Questions

Parents & carers felt that the biggest question they had related to their child's future career is knowing how to choose the right option.

Communication Preferences

75% of parents/carers want to be kept informed about apprenticeships and other opportunities in Hertfordshire, they would most like to receive information about apprenticeships via **Online platforms** or via an **Information Pack**.



SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Inform

Create a centralised framework of activities, events and resources aimed at Hertfordshire parents and carers, to build their knowledge and awareness of Apprenticeships and T Levels. This will help to boost confidence and awareness of how to access the range of support available.

2. Inspire

Promote case studies and inspirational stories of local apprentices (with their employers) showing how they are valued, happy and progressing their careers through apprenticeships. This will help to tackle some of the negative driving factors that parents have reported.

3. Impact

Work on a schedule of confidence building workshops, helping parents to see how to explore and apply for apprenticeships. Support parents to get online, understand the different systems and processes that might be used in apprenticeship recruitment, and help them to see how they can play an important part in supporting their child through the application process.






The survey generated **3,225 responses** from **across 51 schools.**

This is a **14%** increase in individual responses (2,826 parents and carers completed the survey in 2022), with 1 less school compared with last year's participation.


Last years' survey had **52 different schools** participate with a combined total of **2,826 responses from parents/carers.** This year saw a **14% increase in the number of participating parents and carers** (+399 responses).








This years' survey achieved a similar spread of participating schools compared with last year, with a large proportion of participating schools located in south and central Hertfordshire.

22% of the parents / carers had children currently in **Sixth Form** (Year 12 and Year 13), which is a +4% increase from last year.

33% of the parents / carers had children currently in **KS4** (Year 10 and Year 11), which is a -5% decrease from last year.

46% of the parents / carers had children currently in **KS3** (Year 7, Year 8 and Year 9), which is a -25% decrease from last year.

This year we asked respondents to only answer with their eldest child in mind, which would have had an effect on the percentage splits for each key stage.



DEMOGRAPHICS

The percentage breakdown of parents/carers who had children within the various different year groups is very similar for surveys completed in 2019, 2020 and 2021. 2022 had a significant increase in responses from parents/carers with children in KS3 (70%) and a decrease in responses with children in KS4 and KS5.

This year we saw an increase in those with children in KS5, which may have had an impact in the overall awareness and confidence levels due to more parents/carers having children in older year groups compared with previous years.


75% (2,417) of parents/carers had children that had already expressed an interest in a particular career option, an increase of +1% compared with last year.

25% (808) of parents/carers had children that had not yet expressed an interest in any particular career option, a decrease of -1% compared with last year.

CAREER OPTIONS

The results from this years' survey showed an increase in identified career interest compared with last year, with **75% of respondents stating that their child has already identified a possible career option** (2,417 respondents).

Results from the survey completed last year showed that **74% of respondents had** already identified possible career options (2,093 respondents).



CAREER OPTIONS

The top 5 career choices in 2023 included:

- 1. Creative & Media
- 2. Computing, Technology & Digital
- 3. Business & Finance
- 4. Sport & Leisure
- 5. Science & Research

Some of these career interests broadly line up with some of the 2021 priority and growth sectors set out in the Hertfordshire Skills and Employment Strategy, as underlined below:

- Life sciences
- Advanced engineering and manufacturing
- Creative (focus on film & media)
- Smart construction
- Agri-tech
- Knowledge and digitally based sectors


The same career categories appeared in the top 5 choices in both the 2022 and 2023 survey results. However, this year **Business and Finance increased it's popularity (+27%)** and took third place, up from fifth place in 2022.

Science & Research saw a decrease in popularity (-10%), moving from last year's third place to fifth place. This could be partially accounted for by the addition of the criminology category this year, which was identified as a possible career option by 5% of respondents.




CAREER OPTIONS

This graph shows the percentage of respondents that expressed an interest in the **top 20** most popular career options each year.

We introduced a number of new career category options this year, such as **Performing Arts**, **Social Media** and **Criminology**, which may have diluted the popularity of some of the existing categories such as **Creative & Media**, **Science & Research**, **Law & Legal** and **Computing**, **technology and digital**.

There were 248 'other' responses, with a high percentage of answers that could fit into one of the given categories. We will readjust this data and distribute 'other' responses to confirm true increases / decreases.




CAREER OPTIONS

84% of parents who responded with children in Key Stage 5 has already expressed an interest in a certain career, which is a +9% increase compared to the results across all age groups, and +8% increase compared with KS5 parents last year.

Within KS5 responses, **Business & Finance was the most popular career interest**, followed by Creative & Media, Computing, Technology & Digital & Science & Research (all very similar to 2022).

Retail & Sales (+200%), Journalism (+120%), Space & Aviation (62%) Creative & Media (+50%) and Business & Finance (+38%) all saw a significant increase in interest compared with last year from those with children in KS5. Hospitality & Food (-76%), Animal Care (-24%) and Teaching & Education (-18%) all experienced a drop in popularity compared with 2022.



The percentage of those who felt that they would encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship increased by 6% since 2022, and the percentage of those that were uncertain decreased by 5% within this year's survey responses, to 24% from 29% last year. These changes show a decrease in uncertainty and an increase in confidence in apprenticeships in 2023, compared with the previous year. Last year, 7% of respondents answered no, they would not encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship, which has decreased by 1% in 2023.

APPRENTICESHIP CONSIDERATION



Since 2022, there has been a slight increase (6%) in the percentage of parents/carers who answered that they would encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship as an option after school or college.

Since 2022, there has also been an decrease (1%) in the percentage of parents/carers who answered that they would not encourage their child to consider an apprenticeship.

The percentage of parents/carers who answered that they might consider encouraging their child to consider an apprenticeship rose by 1% over the last 5 years.

This table shows the responses by the age of the respondents children.

A slight increase is shown in the percentage of negative answers from parents/carers of children in Year 12 & 13. However, 70% of parents/carers with children in Year 13 answering that they would consider an apprenticeship, which is in line with the survey average.

It seems that parents with older children (Years 11-13) who have already considered their options, are more confident in their opinion about whether an apprenticeship is suitable for their child and have given it more thought or indeed they have already decided on their next step.

QUESTIONS 5 & 6

If your child wanted to apply for an apprenticeship or university, would you know how to help them to apply and what steps to take?



11% of this years' survey respondents felt that they knew all the relevant information needed to apply for an apprenticeship, an increase from 9% last year.

30% of this year's survey respondents felt that they **knew some information** about the apprenticeship application process, an increase from 28% last year.

58% of respondents **felt that they had no idea how to go about it,** a decrease from 60% last year.

In contrast, the confidence levels of full time university applications are slightly lower than last year, with 3% less respondents saying they know all or some information about how to apply and 2% more saying they have no idea.

This chart breaks down the awareness and confidence levels regarding the **apprenticeship application** process based on the total number of responses from each survey year since 2019.


The data shows an increase this year in those who felt that they had all the relevant information to help their child apply for an apprenticeship (11%) an increase from 9% last year.

This year's responses also saw an increase in confidence from those who felt that they knew some of the relevant information (30% up from 28% last year).

Overall, **89% of respondents did not feel confident** in knowing how to support their child to apply for an apprenticeship.



This chart breaks down the percentage of each different awareness level based on the total number of responses from each survey year since 2019.

This years' results saw a slight drop in application awareness for full-time university.

There was a decrease in the percentage of respondents who felt that they knew some of the relevant information, 39% from 42% last year.

There was also an increase in the percentage of respondents that felt they had no idea on how to help their child apply to full-time university, 26% from 24% last year.



APPLICATION AWARENESS

The percentage of each different awareness level for both the university and apprenticeship application process based on the total number of responses is broken down here.

Overall, confidence levels were higher for the university application process compared with apprenticeships with 32% of responses feeling that they knew all the relevant information for university, compared with just 11% for apprenticeships.

The percentage of parents/carers who felt that they had all the relevant information to help their child apply for full-time university has grown from 22% of total responses to 32% since 2019.

In comparison, the percentage of parents/carers who felt that they had all the relevant information to help their child apply for an apprenticeship has risen from 8% to 11% since 2019.




What would be the biggest influences and drivers when encouraging your child to do an apprenticeship? Please select all that apply.



Respondents that answered 'other' included comments such as:

- "I would definitely encourage an apprenticeship over university but they seem to be very difficult to come by."
- "Depends on what they choose to do, an apprenticeship may be a more appropriate route to achieve their goal. Equally an apprenticeship might not be appropriate for all children, very much depends on the child."
- "Unlikely that they will find an available apprenticeship."
- "If guarantees were in place to ensure the apprenticeship had to continue for the duration of the contract, then there would be more security for the student and then I would feel more comfortable in discussing it as an option."
- "Speaking as one who started on an apprenticeship and was laid off with all the other apprentices. I would advocate for the freedom of personally determining one's tertiary education. Companies aren't very good at putting education first in adverse trading conditions."
- "My child has option to work in any country and not having a higher education would prevent transferability of skills due lack of education."
- "I'm concerned about how robotics, AI and automation will change the world of work in the next 20 years. Will the roles offered by apprenticeships even exist in 10 years?"


What concerns might dissuade you from encouraging your child to consider an apprenticeship?








This graph shows a comparison of **positive awareness** levels from previous year's survey responses and this year.

2023 saw a noticeable increase in confidence for apprenticeships across all levels.


As well as apprenticeships and full-time university, there are many other options for your child that are available now and in the coming years.



OTHER OPTIONS

Regarding other available options, **respondents understanding of T Levels were lowest**, with 73% of total respondents answering that they did not know anything about this option. Respondents felt most confident with A levels and university. Only 10% of respondents felt they knew a lot about apprenticeships, but **65% felt they knew a little.**

Regarding other available options, respondents were **most likely to encourage their children to consider A levels (86%)** and FE College (39%), even though only 13% of parents & carers felt that they knew a lot about FE College. Respondents were **least likely to encourage their child to consider a gap year** and the **most unsure about T Levels**.






Have you previously heard of HOP (Hertfordshire Opportunities Portal)?








Responses show that the top preferences for how parents/carers would like to receive information about apprenticeships are **Online**, followed by an **Information Pack**.

Compared with 2022, the data shows a +5% increase in respondents who might like to learn more via an information pack, by hearing from employers or by attending an event.








Are you aware of any friends, family members or colleagues that have previously completed or are currently working towards an apprenticeship?
